Able-Bodied Adults without Dependents (ABAWD)

The Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) approved Alaska's new ABAWD waiver that will be effective November 1, 2024. Boroughs/census areas with locally high unemployment rates will remain exempt, but the Anchorage Borough will be ABAWD required.

Every state is allotted a number of discretionary exemptions that can be used to exempt specific ABAWD required individuals from the time limit. The state of Alaska has decided to apply our discretionary exemptions to ABAWD required individuals living in the Alaska Native Village of Eklutna.

<u>Use of discretionary exemptions may only be used if no other ABAWD exemption applies.</u>
If an individual is eligible for any other ABAWD exemption, this must be used rather than the discretionary exemption. If more than one ABAWD exemption applies to the SNAP recipient, use the exemption that will last the longest.

Example: An ABAWD required individual living in Eklutna is pregnant. The exemption reason used on the ABWD screen in EIS will be based on pregnancy not the discretionary exemption.

SNAP recipients subject to the ABAWD time limit, regardless of exemption status, continue to be subject to the reporting requirements as explained in SNAP MS 602-1(L)(11).

Caseworkers must correctly identify individuals that must meet the ABAWD work requirements and be able to explain the work requirements that an ABAWD must meet in order to accurately code these individuals on the WORK and ABWD screens in EIS.

Attached to this broadcast you will find an ABAWD desk guide. This guide includes basic ABAWD policy and processing instructions that all DPA staff need to read and follow. EIS Procedure 2015-2 explaining the Able-Bodied Adult Without Dependents (ABWD) Tracking Screen is also available on the DPA web page under Employee Resources, Program Policy and Procedure Manuals at http://dpaweb.hss.state.ak.us/node/15. The ABAWD web-based training from SD&T is now available at https://hsstraining.alaska.gov/course/view.php?id=6463.

We must identify all individuals that will be subject to the ABAWD time limit starting in November and update the coding in EIS. A list of all SNAP recipients that may be ABAWD required will be distributed and must be completed by adverse action in October. We cannot wait until the next certification period as the time limit for non-exempt ABAWDs starts in November.

A list of exempt and non-exempt areas as of November 2024 is attached to this broadcast and Addendum 2 of the SNAP manual will be revised December 2, 2024.

In Alaska, the federal work requirement for ABAWDs in Alaska will change effective November 1, 2024. ABAWD individuals who are <u>not</u> meeting these work requirements may only receive up to three (3) months of SNAP benefits within a 36-month period, **not counting any prorated months**. <u>Remember that a month in which the household only receives PFD hold harmless is not a countable ABAWD month.</u>

Who is an ABAWD?

An ABAWD is an able-bodied adult between the ages of 18 and 54 in a SNAP household without children under the age of 18.

Who is eligible?

ABAWDs residing in non-exempt areas will be limited to receiving three months of SNAP benefits in a 36 month period unless they are:

- Under the age of 18 or over the age of 54;
- Working 20 or more hours a week, averaged monthly;
- Participating in an approved work activity 20 or more hours a week, averaged monthly; or
- A combination of both.

Can an ABAWD regain eligibility?

A person who has used their three countable months may regain eligibility for SNAP benefits if any of the following occur:

- Works or participates in an approved employment and training activity at least 80 hours in a 30 day period;
- Becomes exempt from work requirements;
- The 36 month period expires and a new 36 month period begins. Alaska's current 36 month period ends December 31, 2024 and a new 36 month period will start January 1, 2025.

What if an ABAWD loses employment?

A person who regained eligibility by working 80 hours or more in a 30 day period then loses this employment shall remain eligible for an additional consecutive three (3) month period. The additional period begins the day they first notify DPA that they no longer meet the work requirement.

Are there exceptions?

An individual may be exempt from ABAWD work requirements if they meet one of the following criteria:

- Medically (either physical or mentally) unable to work;
- Pregnant:
- Residing in a household with a dependent child. A dependent is defined as a child under the age of 18
 years old that is included in the SNAP household;
- Responsible for the care of an incapacitated adult (either a household member or non-household member);
- Receiving unemployment compensation;
- Participating in a drug or alcohol treatment program;
- Living in an exempt area due to locally high unemployment rates;
- Enrolled at least half time in a school or training program although a student may be exempt from ABAWD work requirements, the student must still meet student exemption criteria and all other applicable SNAP eligibility requirements;
- Homeless Individuals;
- Veterans;
- Individuals aging out of foster care; or
- Discretionary exemption (see explanation below).

Discretionary Exemptions:

The state of Alaska has decided to apply our discretionary exemptions to ABAWD required individuals living in the following census area of Anchorage that are subject to the ABAWD time limit:

Native Village of Eklutna

Use of discretionary exemptions may only be used if no other ABAWD exemption applies.

If an individual is eligible for any other ABAWD exemption, this must be used rather than the discretionary exemption. If more than one ABAWD exemption applies to the SNAP recipient, use the exemption that will last the longest.

Example:

An ABAWD required individual living in the Native Village of Eklutna is pregnant. The exemption reason used on the ABWD screen in EIS will be based on pregnancy not the discretionary exemption.

Are there special processes for ABAWDs?

No special case reviews are required to identify and stop benefits for persons becoming ineligible under this ABAWD policy, but there will be shortened certification periods for any household that contains a non-exempt ABAWD.

- Starting in October 2024, all applications and recertifications will be screened for ABAWD criteria as countable months start in November 2024.
- Starting with the benefit month of November 2024, caseworkers will add correct coding to the WORK screen so that EIS can start tracking countable months for those that are not exempt.
- All identified ABAWD households starting November 2024 will be assigned the CARC of 6-64 (pended cases use: 6-41)
- All statewide Eligibility Technician II's will process ABAWD cases.

Example:

A household submits application on November 13, 2024 for SNAP and Medicaid. The SNAP household contains a non-exempt ABAWD that is not currently meeting the work requirements. The ABAWD work requirements and SNAP limitations are explained to the applicant during the interview. This individual indicates they would like to receive SNAP benefits and start using their countable months. This information is documented in the case note.

This client is found eligible for SNAP benefits and is certified November 2024 – February 2025. November is a prorated month so this month does not count towards their three ABAWD months but December, January, and February are countable months.

The case is CARC'd to FSO-6-64.

Please refer to SNAP manual section <u>602-1L</u> for ABAWD policy and SNAP manual section <u>602-1F</u> for Work Requirement policy. **Note:** Persons exempt from the basic SNAP work requirements are exempt from the ABAWD work requirements and time limits.

Certification Periods

The certification period for SNAP households that contain a member subject to the ABAWD work requirements and time limits should be the initial prorated month (if any) and all three potentially countable ABAWD months. Any month in which the household did not qualify for any federal SNAP benefits would not count as a potential ABAWD month. As explained in <u>SNAP MS 604-1(A)</u>, the first month of the certification period is the first month the household is eligible for SNAP benefits.
