



Food Stamp Trafficking

Selling or trading Food Stamps is always wrong.

Selling your Quest card to exchange your Food Stamp Benefits for cash, alcohol, drugs, tobacco, weapons or other items is known as “trafficking.”

Trafficking your food benefits is a violation of the Food Stamp Program and the penalty is permanent disqualification from the program.

Trying to sell your Food Stamps?

That’s a bad idea.

In fact, even intending to sell your QUEST card by offering it to someone, or posting it for sale on social media sites such as Craig’s List, Facebook, Twitter, and eBay is a violation and may result in permanent disqualification from the Food Stamp Program.
